

How do you find the right poster in this huge archive, Mrs Richter?

I have direct access to around 165,000 posters. These are filed on some 120,000 index cards, while an additional 45,000 are recorded electronically in a digital library.


How can us "mere mortals" admire these treasures?

Even when no exhibition is taking place, we offer frequent guided tours of the archives. Our database can also be accessed by the public at eMuseum.ch.

What is your favourite poster?

It's impossible to answer – the collection has so many forms of creative expression and themes. I find it much more exciting to bring together the posters in contrasting, often unexpected ways so as to tell a story.

Dr. Bettina Richter (52) has been the curator of the poster collection at the Museum für Gestaltung since 2007.

Arte al lago

The art and design scene around Lago di Lugano is booming, with the LAC cultural centre providing a new home for the Museo d'arte della Svizzera italiana. Resident technical expert and designer Graziano "Kiko" Gianocca has been the impetus for the Swiss design platform "Artificio".

rossing the boundaries between Lugano's cultural institutions and free art scene, artist and jewellery designer Graziano "Kiko" Gianocca became technical expert of the former Museo Cantonale d'Arte in 2008. It's now called the Museo d'arte della Svizzera italiana (MASI) and housed in the new LAC Lugano Arte e Cultura cultural centre.

Shortly before starting his new role as technical expert, Gianocca returned from a seven-year stint in Australia, bringing with him the prestigious Emerging Artist Grant of Australia award. Back on home turf, he soon won the Swiss Design Award. But Graziano Gianocca is eager for more – besides his role at the museum, he is spearheading Lugano's cultural renaissance.

Shop window for design Inspired by the famous design tradition in nearby Como and Milan, Gianocca has collaborated with his colleague Carlotta Rossi to

set up the project "Artificio – a platform for design". The wide-reaching exhibition in Lugano aims to bring Ticinese and Swiss design to the fore. Part of its concept is to showcase the work of local, national and international artists in the shop windows of stores and boutiques, as well as in independent cultural spaces and galleries – even in a greenhouse in one case.

How did the exhibition get its name? "The Italian word 'artificio' comes from 'arte', or 'art'," says Gianocca. "It means creating something while adhering to the principles of art. So, for instance 'fuoco d'articifio' (fireworks) is a manmade work of art from fire."

Gianocca applies the same meticulous level of displaying artworks at the MASI as he does to sourcing exhibits for "Artificio" and decorating the shop windows of the boutiques lining Via Nassa – therefore ensuring that the culture scene in Lugano continues to flourish and thrive.

Now one of the city's trendiest areas, the former working class district Quartier des Bains in the south of Geneva was once home to garages, watch-making workshops and factories for high-precision mechanics. In 2015, the New York Times dubbed the hip quarter "the little SoHo of Geneva".



"La Nuit des Bains" is the name of the cultural event first staged by three gallery owners around the turn of the millennium, which still attracts young art lovers in their thousands every year. On the "Night of the baths", visitors get their culture fix in the galleries and museums, before heading over to the Rue de l'École-de-Médecine to sip cocktails in one of the cool bars. quartierdesbains.ch



Café Birdie Food & coffee



Charming Café Birdie is the perfect place to begin a spin of the Quartier des Bains. "Great Coffee, Good Food, Warm Welcome" is the strapline that appears under the trademark pigeon logo at the café at Rue des Bains 40. Students and art lovers flock here for a filter coffee, which has recently become en vogue again. Or perhaps for an

espresso made with love and flair by the resident barista using a handmade La Marzocco coffee machine from Florence. It also serves sandwiches made with bread from the local bakery, filled with regional, seasonal ingredients. After you hit the museums and galleries, the café is a comfy place to kick back with coffee, homemade pastries and people-watching on the street outside.

Musée Patek <u>Philippe</u> Haute horlogerie



Spread across four floors, the museum zooms in on more than 500 years of horology and watchmaking. There's an exhibition devoted to historic watches, mechanical music automatons



and portrait miniatures. In addition, the valuable creations of the Geneva-based watch manufacturer founded in 1839 are on display for all to admire.

Café des Bains Totally relaxed



The charming Café des Bains at Rue des Bains 26 isn't only a major draw for day-trippers and night owls at the Nuit des Bains. Reopened by Blaise Hatt-Arnold and Caroline Vogelsang in February 2000 and bearing the hallmark of Charles Pictet Architects, the café lends a modern touch to the area, while retaining the warmth of a classic bistro. The design is sleek but still reveals plenty of attention to detail. Caroline grew up in a family of contemporary art collectors in Zurich, and it shows - she has lovingly decorated

the restaurant with art from her own private collection and handpicked designer pieces. The result is a mix of good music, attentive service, creative world flavours and a totally relaxed atmosphere.




MAMCO Contemporary



Right in the heart of the "Des Bains" industrial quarter, the factory dating to 1958 has been home to the MAMCO, as Geneva's Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art is known, for more than 20 years. The large windows, even larger rooms and floors still bear the traces of the machines that once stood here and reveal the building's industrial past. Some objects from this time have even been converted into artworks, such as the wall clocks, which not only show the time, but also invite visitors to think about time itself. Switzerland's largest museum for modern and contemporary arts counts works by Sylvie Fleury, Jenny Holzer, Christo, Martin Kippenberger and many more among its collection.

Although Rue de l'École-de-Médecine is abbreviated locally to REM it has nothing whatsoever to do with sleep. It's one of many streets in the neighbourhood that buzzes with bars and restaurants worth discovering. Musée MEG Architectural gem



The Geneva Ethnography Museum was founded in 1901 and today comprises one of Switzerland's biggest ethnographic collections. Since 2014, it has been housed in a new construction by Zurich architects Marco Graber and Thomas Pulver. Behind its attention-grabbing façade, the building showcases some 80,000 objects and 300,000 documents. A permanent exhibition spotlights how different cultures have evolved over time.

Lausanne: dance

From the Ballets Russes to the Prix de Lausanne, and Béjart Ballet Lausanne to the contemporary dance of Philippe Saire – the city on Lake Geneva's shores has always been in the dance spotlight.

he ongoing love affair between Lausanne and dance began in 1915 with the illustrious Ballets Russes, the world's most famous ensemble at the time. Dancers were scattered across Europe during the turmoil of the First World War, until choreographer Serge Diaghilev formed the new Ballets Russes in Lausanne. Here they found not only a stage but also a safe refuge.

The Lausanne dance scene then had its big breakthrough some 30 years ago when the city managed to lure the famous dancer and choreographer Maurice Béjart and his company to Switzerland.

Béjart already knew and loved the Lake Geneva Region from his holidays there. To thank the city – which he chose from many others, including Paris – for its hospitality, he called his company Béjart Ballet Lausanne. Later, in 1992, he founded the École-Atelier Rudra Béjart Lausanne, with the desire to "teach young dancers also in an intellectual and ethical way".

Philippe Saire redefines the dance scene

Choreographer Philippe Saire is one of the biggest exponents of contemporary Swiss dance. Like Béjart, he founded his company in Lausanne in the 1980s. In 1998, he was







the first choreographer to win the Grand prix de la Fondation Vaudoise for his outstanding contribution to the arts. Saire initially staged his productions at the Lausanne Opera, but when he looked for new creative outlets in 1995, he came across a former warehouse for electrical goods in the Flon district. Here he set up Théâtre Sévelin 36, which won the first-ever "Special Dance Award" at the Swiss Dance Awards in 2013. Philippe Saire's connection to Lausanne inspired his "Cartographies", choreographic intervention in the urban environment. Saire's choreography brings different places in the city to life in extraordinary ways.




















At the art temple

The latest addition to Basel's burgeoning cultural scene is the expansion of the Kunstmuseum. Architects Christ & Gantenbein created a striking and particularly fitting backdrop for the collection from 1950 and for special exhibitions.

Interview: Christian Sidow

The architects Christ & Gantenbein



Emanuel Christ, Christoph Gantenbein, what architectural thought went into the new building?

The architectural leitmotiv was "one museum, two houses". The new structure merges seamlessly into the existing one to form a unified entity. For us, this meant that we had to create a vernacular between the new and existing buildings on many levels.

To what extent does the building embody your competition ideas?

Its clean external lines, the frieze that plays on Classical Antiquity, the interior lighting – these key elements were predefined in the original plans.

What has been your most challenging project to date?

Given the project duration and the public and political interest, it has to be the expansion of the Swiss National Museum in Zurich. The competition was in 2002, but it wasn't until 2009 that we completed the first stage of renovation. Last year the new building and art school wings were inaugurated and the reno-



vation will continue well into 2020. It's hard to maintain a continuous approach over such a long period of time.

Have you specialised in designing museums?

It has just taken its natural course. It all began with the Swiss National Museum in Zurich, then in 2009 came the expansion of Kunstmuseum Basel, and now we're planning the expansion of the Wallraf-Richartz Museum in Cologne.

Emanuel Christ and Christoph

Gantenbein set up their architecture practice in Basel in 1998. Since then they have been designing public and private buildings in Switzerland, England, Mexiko and China.





The new addition to Kunstmuseum Basel rises strikingly above the main building dating to 1936. Spanning 2,740 square metres, the spacious new rooms showcase works from 1950 to 1990 and special exhibitions.

Basel's Picasso wonder

The Basel art world was in uproar 50 years ago – two Picasso paintings, which were on loan to the Kunstmuseum, were sold to an overseas buyer due to the financial difficulties of the family that owned them.

Strongly opposed to the sale, a group of Basel students fought for the paintings to stay in their hometown, with the slogan "All you need is Pablo". The protest prompted Basel citizens to dig deep and contribute more than six million Swiss francs to purchase the paintings.

Pablo Picasso was so moved by this demonstration of affection that he gave the city three more paintings and a drawing as a gift. These six works are still on display at Kunstmuseum Basel.



is the weight of the largest wheel: the red wooden wheel that drives the carousel horse.

is the length of the red theatre curtain that Tinguely "took with him" from a warehouse near Paris.



4,5 m high

is the height visitors can climb on steps and ladders to reach the sculpture – these were initially only conceived as scaffolding.

6 people

worked for 2 weeks to disassemble and pack the sculpture ready for transport.

6 lorries with trailers

are needed to transport the sculpture from one place to another – a seldom occurrence for obvious reasons.



Zug Creativity made in Zug

Since baroque times, Zug has been renowned for its goldsmithery. Alongside jewellers, fashion designers, glassblowers and furniture designers work in its pretty historic centre today. Caroline Flueler, for instance, designs the uniform of the SWISS cabin crew. On the design tour, you'll visit the designers who produce, work and sell their wares in Zug.

<u>Geneva</u> Art history

Showcasing around 7,000 exhibits – from prehistoric finds to contemporary art – the Musée d'art et d'histoire in Geneva is one of Switzerland's biggest and greatest museums. Housed in an imposing neoclassical building dating to 1910, the museum shelters one of the most important collections with works by Ferdinand Hodler.

Bern Parties in the sports hall

Where Paul Klee once did his matriculation exams in 1898, you can now sip coffee, enjoy a concert or discuss books. The former secondary school is now a cultural centre: some 150 artists work in PROGR – from graphic designers to filmmakers. The staff room is a bar and the sports hall hosts parties at the weekend.

Bern Female artists in focus

Switzerland's oldest art museum, which opened in 1879, has become famous the world over thanks to works from the likes of Picasso, Kandinsky, Hodler and Anker. The collection comprises more than 50,000 works, and the gallery places special emphasis on female artists such as Meret Oppenheim, Sophie Taeuber-Arp and Marina Abramovic.

<u>La Chaux-</u> <u>de-Fonds</u> Le Corbusier

This stroll through La Chaux-de-Fond puts the city's most famous son in the spotlight: Charles-Edouard Jeanneret, better known as Le Corbusier. The guided tour shows the most important buildings of Le Corbusier's youth: his birthplace, his first architectural office, the famous Villa Turque and the Art Nouveau villa Maison Blanche.

Zurich World-class

The high-calibre temporary exhibitions can almost make you forget just how outstanding the permanent collection is. The Kunsthaus is home to the most comprehensive collection of Alberto Giacometti's works, as well as the largest Munch collection outside of Norway. Other highlights include Impressionism, Swiss painting and Classic Modernism. When it's dark, don't miss the colourful video projection "Tentative Lights" by Pipilotti Rist, one of Switzerland's most famous artists, which graces the glass roof and facade.



The Olympic Park was designed by Lausanne land-scape architect Jean-Yves
Le Baron. Here he reveals a little about the concept of the park and presents four other Swiss parks that are among his favourites.

In the Olympic Park, which links the Olympic Museum with the Musée de l'Elysée, we wanted to seamlessly bring together the existing and the new. The park is split into four different themes that together form a harmonious whole - the Olympic Walk, whose steps bear the names of all torchbearers from 1936 to today, the Garden of Records with its 100-metre tartan track, the large promenade that connects the lake to the museum and winds around the whole park, as well as the sculpture garden displaying works from the museum collection.

<u>Lausanne</u> Place de Milan

Those who live in Lausanne like me are familiar with the playground in Parc Milan. But the beautiful green space also has plenty to offer adults – for instance Crêt de Montriond, one of the city's loveliest viewpoints.



Geneva Parc des Bastions

The park at the foot of Geneva's Old Town is a green oasis in the heart of the city and every season has its charm. In summer giant chessboards invite to play and in winter there is a wonderful ice rink.



Geneva La Grange

In the historic park on the left bank of the lake, there is a tremendous view of the bay and the Jet d'Eau fountain. The mature trees, the rose garden and the open-air theatre make it a unique and peaceful escape.



Zurich MFO-Park

This park opened in 2002 in the grounds of the former Oerlikon engineering factory and I'm impressed by how it translated the idea of the pavilion from classical garden landscaping into striking modern architecture.

Art & design sleeps

If you love art, you're going to love being immersed in it day and night. But far more comfortable than bedding down in a museum or gallery is a stay in one of the Swiss Design & Lifestyle Hotels. Here are six gems to whet your appetite.



Hôtel N'vY, Geneva

Art is integral to this four-star hotel in central Geneva, which bears the hallmark of Parisian interior designer Patrick Ribes. Works by young international artists like Triny Prada, Jean-Pierre Rives and Damien Richard hang alongside graffiti works by American street art legend Jonathan "Meres One" Cohen. Inspired by cult author and eternal nomad Jack Kerouac, his murals pep up the walls of the Tag's Café and the hotel's rooms and suites.


